

Executive Summary and Trend Data

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Executive summary

The Minnesota Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF) prepares a forecast of its expenditures in major programs twice annually. Forecasted programs include the Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP), Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) and NorthStar Care for Children. Projected expenditures for these programs are used in statewide budget forecasts that Minnesota Management and Budget releases in November and February each year. These forecasts are used to update fund balances and provide financial information to the Governor and the legislature as they work together to set budgets. Forecast changes within these DCYF programs are described in the pages that follow.

All February 2025 forecast highlights in this document represent changes from the November 2024 forecast.

FEBRUARY 2025 FORECAST HIGHLIGHTS

General Fund (GF)

Changes from the November 2024 forecast

- Decrease of \$5.7 million in 2024-2025 biennium (-1.4%)
- Decrease of \$16.3 million in 2026-2027 biennium (-2.3%)
- No change in 2028-2029 biennium (+0.0%)
- Overall decrease of \$22 million across the entire forecast horizon (2.0%)

Reasons: The February forecast produces a \$22 million General Fund decrease across the entire forecast horizon, which represents a 2.0% change. This forecast change is primarily the result of a decrease in CCAP caseload. The caseload reductions in CCAP reflects lower-than-expected participation among MFIP recipients.

> The February forecast also produce small reductions in projected MFIP and Northstar Care spending. The MFIP reduction is based on greater reliance on federal funds to fund the program. The Northstar Care reduction reduction represents base adjustments made in response to slightly lower-thanexpected Foster Care and Adoption Assistance recipients in recent months.

• Over 80,000 people a year are served through DCYF forecasted programs

How much it costs

- \$677 million total spending in DCYF forecasted programs
- \$173 million state spending in DCYF forecasted programs

Data for FY 2024

Together, the caseload adjustments result in General Fund forecast decreases of \$5.7 million in the 2024-2025 biennium and \$16.3 million in the 2026-2027 biennium.

Minnesota Family Investment Program

The Minnesota Family Investment Program (MFIP) provides cash and food assistance for low-income families with children. MFIP operates as Minnesota's federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program. As such, MFIP cash assistance is funded with a mixture of federal TANF Block Grant and state General Fund dollars determined primarily by the federally mandated Maintenance of Effort (MOE) requirement for state spending on its TANF program.

• 62,100 average monthly recipients

How much it costs

- \$296 million total spending
- \$69 million state funds

February 2025 Forecast Highlights

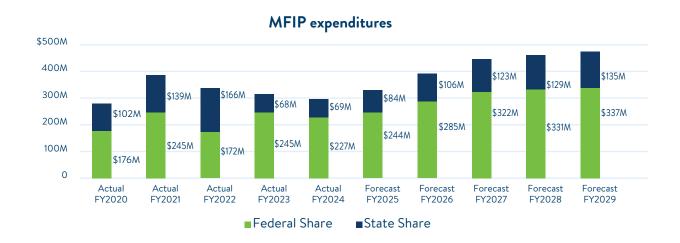
General Fund

Changes from the November 2024 forecast

- Decrease of \$0.7 million in 2024-2025 biennium (-0.5%)
- Decrease of \$0.2 million in 2026-2027 biennium (-0.1%)
- Increase of \$2.0 million in 2028-2029 biennium (+1.1%)

Reasons

The February MFIP forecast produces small General Fund savings in both the 2024-2025 and 2026-2027 biennia. These forecast changes are primarily driven by greater reliance on federal funds to fund the program relative to the November forecast.

Child Care Assistance

This program provides child care assistance to MFIP families who are employed or are engaged in other work activities or education as part of their MFIP employment plan. This activity also provides transition year (TY) child care assistance for former MFIP families. As with the MFIP grant program, child care assistance is funded with a mixture of federal and state General Fund dollars. The federal child care funding comes from the Child Care Development Fund (CCDF). The forecast does not include the Basic Sliding Fee child care program.

FEBRUARY 2025 FORECAST HIGHLIGHTS

Changes from the November 2024 forecast

General Fund

- Decrease of \$4.4 million in 2024-2025 biennium (-7.1%)
- Decrease of \$15.8 million in 2026-2027 biennium (-6.2%)
- Decrease of \$1.3 million in 2028-2029 biennium (-1.7%)

Who it serves

MFIP/TY Child Care

4,900 average monthly families served

How much it costs

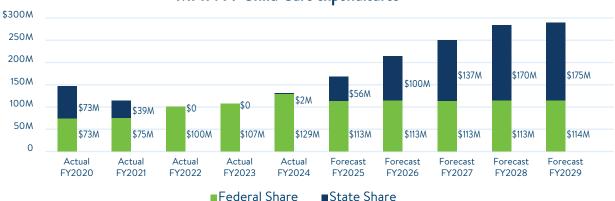
MFIP/TY Child Care

- \$131 million in total spending
- \$2 million state funds

Data for FY 2024

Reasons: The February Child Care Assistance forecast produces state savings in the 2024-2025 and 2026-2027 biennia. These forecast reductions are primarily driven by lower caseload. This projected childcare caseload reduction is tied to the lower participation in the program among MFIP recipients in recent months.

Northstar Care for Children

Northstar Care for Children is designed to help children who are removed from their homes and supports permanency through adoption or transfer of custody to a relative if the child cannot be safely reunified with parents. Financial support is provided to adoptive and foster parents to encourage permanent placement of children in safe homes. Northstar Care for Children consolidates and simplifies administration of three existing programs: Family Foster Care, Kinship Assistance and Adoption Assistance.

- \$250 million total spending
- \$102 million state funds

General Fund

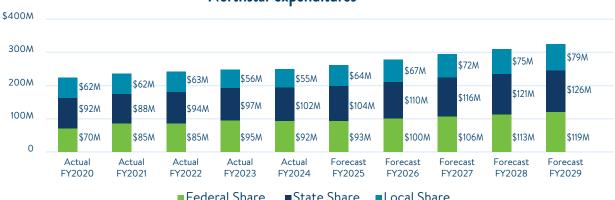
Changes from the November 2024 forecast

- Decrease of \$0.5 million in 2024-2025 biennium (-0.5%)
- Decrease of \$0.4 million in 2026-2027 biennium (-0.2%)
- Decrease of \$0.4 million in 2028-2029 biennium (-0.2%)

Reasons

The February forecast for NorthStar Care produces small General Fund savings in the 2024-2025 and 2026-2027 biennia. The forecast reductions are the result of lower-than-expected Foster Care and Adoption Assistance caseload, which is partially offset by an increase in projected Kinship Assistance recipients.
